PROVEN PERFORMERS

Back in 2000 the American Rhododendron Society launched something called the **Good Do-ers Project**. It was designed to introduce rhododendrons that do exceptionally well in the gardens of American Rhododendron Society members to non-member gardeners.

In the first step local ARS chapters developed lists of plants that do well in the gardens of their members — **Proven Performers**. In step two the ARS Plant Awards Committee selected rhododendrons in seven geographical regions of North America for **Rhododendron of the Year Awards**.

For the past four years the ARS has been sending out some 450 press releases to newspapers and magazines across the continent to announce these special rhododendrons and the Plant Committee is implementing step three of the project. In this step wholesale and retail nurseries are being notified of the winners (three years in advance of the public announcement) so those special rhodies can be available in the trade when the awards are announced.

Eureka Chapter's Proven Performers list hasn't really been updated since it was first created, and as the project has evolved, some rules have been developed or changed.

We'd like to get in the habit of updating the lists regularly in the spring, since nominations for the **Rhododendron of the Year Awards** are always taken from the **Proven Performers** lists. And we need to include azaleas on our lists, too, since the awards are given in five classes — elepidote, lepidote, evergreen azalea, deciduous azalea and vireya.

During the **February meeting**, we'd like to update the **Eureka Chapter Proven Performers** list, so take a look around your garden and see what plants do really well for you. First off, the plant must be registered. Beyond that, we are looking for plants that grow well in our area, have nice foliage and shape, and bloom well and reliably. Make a list and bring it to the meeting with you. (I'll have my Greer book, so if you don't know if it's a lepidote or and elepidote, we can look it up!).

The Rhododendron Year—February...Use mall amounts of "fritted trace elements". This will help create darker foliage and help future fertilizer assimilation. This is an excellent time to plant your previous year's crosses and to make grafts.

WORD OF THE MONTH

June Walsh has been requesting this for months, so here goes. The word of the month is "campylogynum" as in Rhododendron campylogynum. The word derives from the Greek campylo- for bent and gyn- for female. It does not refer, however, to an elderly woman with osteoporosis. The gyn part is related to the botanical term gynoecium, meaning the tissues surrounding the eggs of a plant, not just a flowering plant. Androecium refers to the equivalent male parts. Linnaeus and other botanists of the time seem to have been obsessed with sex; they classified all plants on the basis of their reproductive parts to the exclusion of nearly all other distinguishing features. In any case, campylogynum refers to the fact that the flower, where it leaves the stalk and forms the ovary and surrounding tissues, is bent nearly at a right angle. R. campylogynum is a rhodie with really beautiful small, almost translucent bell-shaped flowers, only three or so in a loose truss. The flowers range in color from a creamy white through various shades of red to almost maroon. If you don't have one in your garden, it doesn't take much room and would be a great addition. by Bruce Palmer
