

The guest speaker will be Dr. Don Selcer who has traveled to many of the Rhododendron Meccas of the world. Don is from Cleveland, Ohio, the home of Holden Arboretum and the Leach Rhododendron Research Station, but it wasn't until he moved to California for pediatric residency training that he discovered gardening. He has recently retired after more than 30 years in his medical practice. Don now volunteers at UCBG in the Asian section.

Don has been gardening with rhodies since the early 80's, mainly growing species from seed on his steep, wooded residential lot in Oakland. He is an active member of the California Chapter. He always liked backpacking, collecting things and photography. Rhododendron trips have combined all his interests. Donhas traveled to Sikkim and India with Britt Smith/ARS trip in 1992 and to Yunnan China on a trip led by Graham Smith (Pukeiiti) and other New Zealanders in 1999. He traveled on a Rhododendron Species Botanical Garden collecting expedition with Steve Hootman in fall 2001 to another part of Yunnan--this one to explore the Dulong River Valley which had not seen Westerners for 80 years.

Don traveled again with an RSBG sponsored tour in late April and early May 2012 to Guangxi, Guizhou, and Chongqing provinces, seeing rhododendrons and lots of other shrubs, trees, and wildflowers. He will also show some fascinating scenes in ethnic villages.

Trusses will be accepted for display from 6 PM until 9 PM on Friday and from 7 AM until 9 AM on Saturday. No entries will be accepted after 9 AM.

Set up will begin at 3:00 PM on Friday the 26th for those of you who are planning to help.

This year we will have the hall all to ourselves. In order to have a great show we need everyone to participate by bring at least 3 trusses. Can you imagine how wonderful the tables will look? Be sure they have plenty of water and the stems are cut long enough to allow the most water to get into the truss.

Anyone can enter trusses and plants, Photography, Educational and Flower Arrangements. If you have a special plant that can be dug or is in a pot, bring it in. Also, don't forget there is an Education category. We have had some really interesting displays in the past. The Photography Exhibit has been a well-filled section. Be sure the photos are matted and not framed.

Carol Dunning will be happy to receive any and all entries for the *Flower Arrangements*. This year we are adding a *Miniature Flower Arrangement* category. The size limitations will be 8 inches by 8 inches by 8 inches. We should have that table at the front of the hall simply full of arrangements. To ensure that there is enough space please call Carol (707- 442-7090) to reserve your space.

Remember, that if you don't believe your flowers are "good enough" for judging, bring them anyway. They will look great as examples of the type of rhododendron they are. They can also fill in the spaces on the tables after the judging. We need all we can get.

Plant of the Month

Rhododendron 'Silver Skies' By Don Wallace

Rhododendron 'Silver Skies' was created by Frank Fujioka of Whidbey Island, and famous for being the creator of such award-winning rhododendrons as Rhododendron 'Seaview Sunset', Rhododendron 'Pomegranate Splash', and Rhododendron 'Starbright Champagne'. The parents of this plant are Rhododendron degronianum ssp. yakushimanum 'Koichiro Wada' x Rhododendron 'Medusa'. So, here we have a light pink species rhododendron crossed with an orange flowering hybrid. There is no orange in the flowers, but what an excellent plant it is. The

foliage is always dark-green and shiny. The plant needs some shade to do well, but will thrive in morning sun. Provide a site where it can grow to 4 ft. wide and 2 ft. tall, which will take 10-15 years. The flowering starts in early April, and will last for most of the month. The new growth will have a nice dusting of tomentum, a silky-white film that is prized by collectors, and thought to be a natural "insect deterrent". The leaves are very similar to the 'yak' parent with thick fawn colored indumentum on the undersides.

WEEDS! *Cirsium arvense*, Canada Thistle (perhaps called American Thistle north of the US border) is an introduced European plant, probably in grain seed, to Canada and the United States. It has spiky purplish-pink flowers. The stem is smooth and the leaves are spiny. The flowers are usually dioecious (having girl flowers or boy flowers on separate plants), but not invariably so, with some plants bearing hermaphrodite (both sexes) flowers. The ripe seeds have a feathery pappus which assists in wind dispersal. The plant also spreads underground using rhizomes which form extensive mats. The plant tends to persist despite our most diligent efforts to eliminate it.

The trick is to be always on your game at elimination. Grub out as much of the root as possible, keep removing the new rosette of spiky leaves that emerge after grubbing. The trick is to wear the plant out before it wears you out. Cut off flower heads before the seeds ripen. The best time to treat Canada thistle with foliar-applied herbicides, which move down through the plant, is in early June after the first flower buds are formed and before the flowers open. Herbicides should be used on fall regrowth during September and early October.

The seeds of Canada Thistle are an important food for American Goldfinch and its foliage is used as food by over 20 species of Lepidoptera, including the Painted Lady butterfly. While you too can eat all parts, you will want to remove the spines from the leaves first. It is related to that other thistle, Artichoke, which we cultivate...on purpose.
